Susan Cooper—The Shortest Day

Written for the Christmas Revels show that is now performed throughout the United States, the beloved poem The Shortest Day captures the magic behind the returning of the light, the yearning for traditions that connect us with prior generations—and the hope for peace that we carry into the future. "This cyclical volume offers an alluringly haunting alternative to more familiar seasonal fare" (Publishers Weekly, starred review). Susan Cooper is the author of many books for children and adults. Her fantasy sequence The Dark Is Rising includes the Newbery Medal winner The Grey King. She lives in Marshfield, Massachusetts.

Marjan Kamali—The Stationery Shop

The Stationery Shop is a beautiful exploration of loss, unbreakable family bonds, and the overwhelming power of love. "Simultaneously briskly paced and deeply moving" (Booklist), the novel is set against the upheaval of 1953 Tehran. "A wistful look at two idealists and the world they should have inherited... Kamali offers a paean not just to lost love, but to the poetry, food, and culture that fed their memories for 60 years" (Christian Science Monitor). Marjan Kamali was born in Turkey to Iranian parents. Her degrees include an MBA from Columbia and an MFA from NYU. She lives in the Boston area.

Jack Goldsmith—In Hoffa's Shadow: A Stepfather, a Disappearance in Detroit, and My Search for the Truth As a young man, Jack Goldsmith revered his stepfather, Jimmy Hoffa associate Chuckie O'Brien. Yet as he pursued a career in law and government, he distanced himself from the man long suspected by the FBI of perpetrating Hoffa's disappearance. Years later he reconsiders and reunites with his stepfather while exploring Hoffa's rise and fall and how the golden age of blue-collar America came to an end. "A thrilling, unputdownable story that takes on big subjects—injustice, love, loss, truth, power, murder" (Bill Buford). Jack Goldsmith is a Harvard Law professor and former assistant attorney general.

WCAB Fall Kick-Off Event with Professor Eni Mustafaraj by Quiana Agbai '02

At our recent Fall Kick-Off Eni Mustafaraj, Assistant Professor of Computer Science, shared an engaging presentation on how the intersection of information sharing and profit have shaped the Internet into such a force. Prof. Mustafaraj began by peppering alums who gathered in the LuLu Chow Wang Campus Center with questions about various Internet history trivia while challenging us to be critical in our consumption of the Internet.



One of the most eye-opening projects that Prof.

Mustafaraj shared was us was Wikipedia "edit-a-thons" which involve Wellesley students hunkering down to update and create pages. It was a lesson in the crowdsourcing format of Wikipedia as well as shedding light on the fact that approximately 90% of the pages are written by men. This information spurred many alums to inquire about a future edit-a-thon event to literally hack this troubling statistic. Stay tuned...

With next year's election approaching, the work that Professor Mustafaraj is doing is crucial especially given that she uncovered the first ever documented use of Twitter bots to attack a political candidate during an election - you can read more about that on her website (http://bit.ly/31olI4h). Currently, Prof. Mustafaraj is in the midst of a 5-year NSF grant studying signals that can be used to evaluate the credibility of online sources on the Web.

The implications of Prof. Mustafaraj's research is crucial in understanding the ways we are funneled through navigating online from social media to search engines and ultimately, pushes us to think critically about what information we're sharing as well as best practices for protecting our privacy. By the end of our time together, Prof. Mustafaraj agreed that yes, while this is daunting, we must never back down in being conscious and critical consumers of what we find on the Internet.

WCAB Celebrates Olmstead by Jane Materazzo '83

On September 14th, about a dozen WCAB members (representing classes from at least four decades!) gathered at the Frederick Law Olmstead National Historic Site to begin a day of celebration for America's foremost landscape architect. As luck would have it, our terrific tour guide Val had a Wellesley connection (MA in Chemistry – yes, that's right, Wellesley used to confer MA degrees!).

Val took us on a fascinating tour of the home and design studio where Olmstead and his family lived during Olmstead's later years, and where Olmstead, his sons, and their successors ran the Olmstead landscape firm until 1979. We learned that Olmstead was actually a "late bloomer" who sampled several other careers before becoming America's foremost landscape architect, and that once he settled on landscape design, his work was deeply informed by his social conscience.

For Olmstead, a beautiful park was not just an end unto itself, but a way to transcend race, creed and social class by providing a place where all people could enjoy, together, a common experience of the beauty of nature. After exploring the interior of Olmstead's home and design studio we enjoyed an outdoor tour of the diverse landscapes that exist right on the property's grounds, which Olmstead cultivated as a way of "advertising" to prospective clients the varied types of designs he could create for them.

At the conclusion of our tour we got a peek at records indicating that Olmstead's firm consulted for Wellesley College both in the early days of the College and again in the 1970's (a "teaser" for those who want to explore further Olmstead's connections to the College.) We concluded our day with a lovely picnic lunch in Olmstead Park, one of the gems of Boston's Olmstead-deigned Emerald Necklace.

Thanks to all who participated! It was a wonderful day.


