The novel concerns urban Native American life specifically in Oakland, California, skills brought with them from the reservations (e.g. hunting but now with drones) and skills they are just now learning. The book is serious but with good humor.

- The Water Dancer, a novel by Ta-Nehisi Coates, 2019 includes interludes about slavery, the underground railroad, Harriet Tubman, and the power of memory
